





CALVING SIMULATOR

Introduction and sign-up: **9:30am**

Simulator sessions: **10am; 11am; 1:30pm**

For the first time at the Smallholder Festival, cattle keepers will be able to hone their calving skills with experts from SRUC Veterinary Services, University of Glasgow School of Veterinary Medicine and a lifelike Calving Simulator.

Booking required, limited to 6 places per session. Please join the 9:30am introduction to sign-up for one of the 45 minute simulator sessions. Places will be allocated on a first-come-first-served basis, and may be available after the intro session – enquire at the SRUC Theatre in the main hall.

MINI WORKSHOPS

10:00am & 11:00am – Construct a willow star

with Anna Liebmann, Foyer Upper Floor

Students will match and select 10 pieces of beautiful, straight, colourful willow butt to tip (that's top to tail) and bind them together with weaving (and some temporary ties!) using soft, flexible soaked basketry willow.

Create a striking piece for your door, tree, or wall. Many of the fundamentals of basketry will be at play: material selection, preparation, and weave tension. Students pieces can range from 6" / 15cm to 16" / 40cm.

Booking required: Participants must be over 8 years of age, under 12s must be accompanied by an adult. £10 charge, cash-only payable to Anna at the session. Please book in the Smallholding Scotland Office in the Foyer.

12 noon – Hairpin crochet

with Ellie Fiddes, Foyer Upper Floor

Hairpin crochet creates a lovely delicate lace. It is worked in braids comprising of loops, secured at the centre by crochet stitches.

These can then be joined together to make scarves or other garments. They can also be joined in circles to create motifs.

Booking required: Participants must be over 16 years of age, and be **confident in the three basic crochet stitches: chain, double, and treble**. £20 charge, cash or card payable to Ellie at the session. Please book in the Smallholding Scotland Office in the Foyer.

PIG PARADISE (IN THE CENTRAL HALL)

At Festival HQ, we know that pigs are an important part of many smallholdings, whether breeding, rearing, and processing as a business, or raising a couple of weaners for the freezer.

We are working with both the Rare Breed Survival Trust and with the British Pig Association to support their aims to protect and promote British traditional breeds of pig. All these breeds are under pressure and smallholders are in a unique and important position to help – and to produce and enjoy fantastic pork as well!

Our Pig Paradise area started in 2016, with the aim of displaying as many of the British traditional breeds as possible – Berkshire, British Lop, British Saddleback, Gloucestershire Old Spot, Large Black, Middle White, Oxford Sandy & Black, Tamworth and Welsh. We're also keen to showcase other breeds too – like the Kunekune breed from NZ, Durocs, Pietrains, Hampshires and Mangalitzas.

Come and meet the piglets, read the information boards, watch in awe as the BPA qualified Judge picks the best pigs in the Pig Show and of course see the world renowned Pig Agility course where there will be some chances for the public to try their hand at taking pigs around an obstacle course set up to replicate some of the tricky maneuvers that pig keepers face daily on the farm.

We have three talks in the seminar programme related to pigs:

- **BPA Starting with Pigs**, in Seminar Room 3 at 12:30pm
- Pernille Jorgenson, SRUC, **Pig MOT** in the pig showing ring at 2:00pm

In 2023, we have improved our show from previous years – and that's a tribute to the breeders and keepers who make the effort to bring pigs to the event.

So please do make the effort to visit the Pig Paradise and have a chat to the keepers (and the pigs) – it's in the Central Hall through the Main Hall.

Working together, we aim to change the entire system for the better: fair deals for local farmers growing nourishing food for people, fewer damaging food miles, more nutrition in every slice of bread and more jobs per loaf as the emphasis moves away from factory bread to community and home-bakers who can bring out the best in our local grains. We do not sell bread ourselves but we champion real sourdough, raised with natural fermentation, using a simple starter of flour and water. We will be demonstrating the sheer simplicity of this method of bread baking - which harnesses the natural yeasts and lactic acid to create a starter and can then be used to make bread from the as few as three simple ingredients - flour water salt.
